

A Home for Today, a PATH for Tomorrow

51,340 people are homeless in Los Angeles County on any given night.

They are women with children, people struggling with serious health issues, war veterans, seniors, former foster youth and families who lost everything because of the recession.

PATH's mission is to end homelessness for individuals, families and communities. We strive to do this by providing rapid re-housing, strategic outreach, permanent supportive housing development and supportive services for the most vulnerable populations.

Four Programs: One Mission

PATH provides services, housing and assistance through four programs working together to address the homelessness issue from different angles.



PATH Services: Supportive Programs
Provides outreach, prevention, job assistance, housing, healthcare, counseling & substance abuse treatment.



PATH Ventures: Permanent Housing
Develops permanent, affordable housing designed for individuals who are homeless or in need.



PATH Gramercy: Family Programs
Provides housing and support for young homeless families while they work to get back on their feet.



PATH Partners: Community Engagement
Works with communities throughout Southern California to raise awareness about preventing and ending homelessness.

PATH's Story

It all started with a letter typed on Westwood Presbyterian Church stationery, bearing a call to action from Rev. Charles Orr.

"Individually and in small groups, many of us have shared a common concern about the homeless in our community," Rev. Orr wrote. "We believe the need is NOW...the time has come to explore what other communities have done, what resources are available, and what steps we can take together to convert our concern into coordinated action. Together we can."

On the night of December 8, 1983, approximately 60 people gathered in the church's basement to address their desire to help homeless people in their neighborhoods. On that night, PATH was born.

Today, PATH has three locations in Los Angeles, with another in the works in San Diego. We have more than 1,000 units of permanent housing in our development pipeline. We have worked in more than 30 cities, and more than 4,000 people in need walk through our doors every single year.
